Selwyn Township is updating its Strategic Plan and Recreation Services Plan with the help of Monteith Brown Planning Consultants. Municipal strategic plans are long-range priority-setting documents, typically spanning five-to-ten-year time frames. They reflect community priorities and help identify and guide decision-making. The Recreation Services Plan and Trails Master Plan will be consolidated into one document.

As one of Peterborough County's fastest-growing municipalities (demonstrated by an impressive 9.3% growth in the 2021 census), 18,653 people call the Township of Selwyn home. Each member of the community has a unique perspective on what they value most about living here!

To get feedback from our residents on what the priorities should be for our area, the Township held an Open House and published an online Community Feedback Form. The Open House on May 29th had a fantastic turnout and was an evening full of great conversations. Over 150 responses have been collected through the online Community Feedback Form. Council and Staff would like to thank everyone who participated for their help in shaping the future of Selwyn Township.





\$60,000 Funding to Install Accessible Docks in Lakefield!

On Thursday, March 14, 2024, dignitaries celebrated the Township receiving a \$60,000 grant through the Inclusive Community Grants Program for the 'Creating an Inclusive Waterfront in Lakefield' project.

The project includes the installation of both an assistive canoe/kayak launch at Isabel Morris Park and a fully accessible canoe/kayak launch at Lakefield Beach. These docks will provide barrier-free access to recreational water activities along the Otonabee River which runs through the Village of Lakefield in Selwyn Township.

By increasing accessibility to outdoor spaces, Selwyn Township's 'Creating an Inclusive Waterfront in Lakefield' project will improve community involvement for our residents.

The Inclusive Community Grants Program, through the Ontario Government, is investing \$750,000 to help communities across the province become more inclusive and accessible for people of all ages and abilities.

Plugging in to a Sustainable Future

On Tuesday, May 28, 2024, Selwyn Township Council members, along with representatives from Aviva Canada and Earth Day Canada officially opened the Township's new electric vehicle chargers.

In November 2023, the Township installed 6 electric vehicle chargers at four locations, including the Township Municipal Office, Ennismore Community Centre, Bridgenorth Library, and the River Den in Lakefield. The new chargers will help expand access to public charging in Selwyn Township, which supports a transition to electric vehicles and

reduces greenhouse gas emissions. Residents and visitors can now charge their plug-in hybrid or electric vehicles across Selwyn Township!

The installation of the new electric vehicle chargers was funded through Aviva Canada's Charged for Change program, presented in partnership with Earth Day Canada.

Following the speeches, Council members and residents were invited to view one of the new electric vehicle chargers in use at the Township Municipal Office.



A final public information meeting regarding the Environmental Assessment will be held this summer for the Ward St. widening in Bridgenorth.



The second year of this council has seen some significant events in our community with respect to COVID-19 and the delivery of healthcare services. I'm honoured to be the Vice Chair of Peterborough Public Health and a member of the Joint Merger Steering Committee representing Peterborough County. In August 2023, the Ministry of Health (MOH) announced plans to strengthen the public health sector by offering one-time funding, resources, and support to local public health agencies to voluntarily merge. As a result, both Peterborough Public Health (PPH) and the Haliburton Kawartha Pine Ridge District Health Units Board of Directors have moved to consider merging. The Province requires that mergers be implemented by January 1, 2025.

The Ontario Government's three-pronged approach to strengthening the public health system includes conducting a review of the Ontario Public Health Standards with an aim to refine, refocus & re-level roles/responsibilities and collaboration with partners to optimize operations. Secondly, enhancing service capacity by facilitating voluntary mergers with financial support for three years. And thirdly, restoring provincial base funding to 2020 levels and implementation of a 1% growth base funding for the next three years. This

strategic approach represents a significant investment in public health that hasn't been seen for many years. Over the past few months, the Joint Merger Steering Committee has worked with PPH staff and consultants to submit a business case to support the financial costs of the proposed merger. The MOH is expected to respond to the business case by this June.

As Board Vice Chair of Four Counties Addictions Services & Treatment I have been working with the staff/board and the Ontario Minister of Mental Health & Addictions to secure funding for a six-bed detox and six bed rehabilitation unit to serve city and county residents with alcohol and/or drug addiction challenges. While harm reduction, safe consumption and treatment sites are important to saving lives, the addition of detox and rehab services will provide a local opportunity to reach sobriety.

COVID-19 continues to have a lingering impact on local small/medium businesses as they work hard to maintain jobs in our community. As the Loans Committee Chair and Secretary to the Board of Community Futures Peterborough (CFP), I have witnessed the challenges many of our Selwyn businesses have faced. CFP has initiated several new grants and loan programs to help support these businesses through recovery.

The Link Rural Transportation System



The Link is a public transportation pilot project in Selwyn Township and Curve Lake First Nation, which connects to the City of Peterborough's Transit system at Trent University. The Link has two routes that run

I came to Council with the prerogative to help navigate planning and development decisions of the Province. However, as the Province continues to develop their guidance, community engagement remains at the forefront of my efforts.

On June 10, 2023, our Council held a Town Hall. We had an excellent turnout discussing a variety of topics (short-term rentals, infrastructure, accessibility). Council took forward this information in many ways, including a delegation led by Councillor Brian Henry with the Minster of Municipal Affairs and Housing in January 2024. These engagement sessions are an important forum for hearing constituent concerns and ideas for improving our communities. This year, our Town Hall was held in Ennismore, and I had the opportunity to speak with many more of you.

As part of the Joint Accessibility Advisory Committee, I help provide information and recommendations to Township and County Councils to improve accessibility and inclusivity. To ensure the Province keeps accessibility and inclusivity in mind when making decisions that will reshape our communities, I led a delegation with the Honourable Raymond Cho, Minister of Seniors and Accessibility in August 2023. In turn, I want to thank staff and the previous Council for their diligence in seeing

accessibility-focused projects come to fruition. On March 14, 2024, Minister Cho visited Selwyn and announced that Selwyn received \$60,000 through the Inclusive Community Grants Program for the development of an accessible kayak launch and docks. Together we will make a difference.

I'd like to thank all the sponsors, vendors, volunteers, and attendees who made the 2023 Ennismore Shamrock Festival an amazing event. This year the festival kicks off with a dance on Friday, July 19, 2024, followed by family day on Saturday and the truck and tractor pull on Sunday. Building from this experience, this year my goal is to increase participation and cohesion of local community organizations. I'm also supporting the Selwyn Public Library in hosting its first Golf Day on August 8, 2024. Mark your calendars!

In September 2023, our Council participated in a Quad Council meeting which included Selwyn Township, Curve Lake First Nation, Trent Lakes, and North Kawartha. The meeting included introductions and discussion of trends across our communities. The next meeting will be hosted by Selwyn Township in September 2024 where I look forward to learning more about our neighbours, our history, and how we can collaborate.

I am pleased to provide you with this update as your Selwyn Township Councillor for Smith Ward.

My role as Chair of the Smith-Ennismore Police Services Board (SEPSB) has evolved as the regulation of policing services is being substantially revamped with the repeal of the Police Services Act on April 1st, 2024, with the enactment of the Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA). As such, the SEPSB will dissolve and join the Peterborough County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Detachment Board, which also includes both Hiawatha and Curve Lake First Nations.

The Board's role is to advise the OPP concerning policing services within Peterborough County's boundaries, and outline the objectives and priorities for police services. The Township will work with our Community Policing Volunteers in responding to the safety and security of our community as defined by the new CSPA.

I will continue to prioritize community safety and mitigating safer roads with fiscal responsibility and support and advocate for funding the OPP – Peterborough Detachment with the resources they need to combat the challenges of Bail Compliance and Warrant Apprehension; and to monitor and apprehend high-risk repeat offenders who are violating their bail or community supervision

conditions and ensure that our front-line officers have access to the necessary mental health supports.

The Selwyn Municipal Heritage Committee, of which I am a proud member, has a few projects that will be finalized this year. These include reopening the Old Post Office Building in Lakefield after the building underwent renovations to create an accessible business space. This summer, the fence situated in the Johnson Bickel Cemetery will also be restored.

The Committee has also been working with a group of Stony Lake cottagers who assembled a not-for-profit organization called Hiawatha Chapel Association. The Association has acquired the Kawartha Park Chapel property on Hiawatha Lane from the Presbyterian Church, and the church will undergo extensive upgrades to have it ready for its 100th Anniversary in 2025!

As we look forward to 2025 and beyond, I have every confidence that Selwyn Council and our Township Staff will meet and exceed your expectations. I encourage you to safely explore and enjoy what our Township has to offer. Thank you for your support and the privilege of representing Selwyn.

Nearly all my time as a Selwyn Township Councillor is devoted to reading, listening, and posing questions. All three involve seeking and seeking to understand objective evidence upon which decisions can be made. Members of Council must be insatiably curious and accept that sometimes we are like members of a jury who arrive at different conclusions based on the same facts.

That's okay. Occasional disagreements among us and with others are to be expected, in fact, welcomed. When informed by respect and humility, disagreements signify a healthy democracy. Respect acknowledges other fact-based opinions and priorities while humility acknowledges that there's always more to learn and that any of us could be wrong.

Respect and humility will guide our community through a months-long consultative process to create a new strategic plan. The Township's current strategic plan was written in 2018 and can be seen on its website.

It states that the Township's vision is to create a progressive, sustainable community and that its mission is to be a leader in providing innovative and effective municipal services. It states that the foundational values upon which all decisions will rest are integrity, trust and respect, environmental responsibility, professionalism, accountability, and individuality. The Township's goals, it states, are to foster a healthy, engaged, and connected community,

achieve excellence in governance and service delivery, support a sustainable, balanced, and investment-ready community, and to cultivate partnerships and promote collaboration. The plan details how each goal will be realized in reasonable and measurable ways.

Strategic plans are not written to be shelved and forgotten. They are living documents. Each report and recommendation that staff presents for Council's consideration explicitly states how it is related to and consistent with the plan's goals. An annual report card reviews actions taken in the pursuit of those goals. The report cards can also be found on the Township's website. On April 23, Council and senior staff met with a consultant from Monteith Brown as the first step in the creation of our new Strategic Plan that will inform decision making for the next decade. I sincerely invite all members of our community to become involved in our next plan's creation. Please respond to a survey, attend a public meeting, and contact a Council member to express your ideas as together, with respect and humility, we strive to make Selwyn an even better place in which to live, invest, and visit.

Another 250 FoodCyclers Making Their Way to Selwyn Residences!

Following a successful FoodCycler™ Pilot Program in 2023, the Township launched another round of the program in March 2024. An additional 250 households can now purchase a FoodCycler™! The FoodCycler[™] is an indoor compost alternative, which dries and grinds food waste into a nutrient-rich fertilizer that can be added to your garden. Simply toss your food scraps into the bucket, press the button, and you're done! The pilot program is a partnership between the Township and a Canadian company, Food Cycle Science, to measure the feasibility of using a FoodCycler™ to support at home composting in Selwyn Township. This program will improve organic waste diversion, which

helps protect the environment and

Final Phase of the Water Street Reconstruction Begins!

The third and final phase of the Water Street Reconstruction project is expected to commence late summer!

Phase 3 consists of final road works, including final lift of asphalt, raising structures, and landscaping. Work will take place on:

- Water Street, between Concession Street and Bridge Street
- · Concession Street, between Water Street and Queen Street
- Reid Street, between Water Street and Queen Street
- King Street, from Water Street and Queen Street

Once construction begins, working hours are expected to be 7:00am to 5:30pm Monday through Friday, with occasional Saturday work if production is lost due to inclement weather or other factors. Accurex Inc. will be setting up their construction trailer again at the Lakefield Marina.

The road will be intermittently closed to through traffic (local traffic

Strickland Street Watermain Replacement Project Begins!

In the spring 2024, Selwyn Township began a watermain replacement project along Strickland Street, from Queen Street to Prospect Street, and along a portion of Prospect Street in Lakefield.

Accurex Inc. will be completing the construction and DM Wills is the engineering firm overseeing the construction. The project includes the installation of new underground watermain infrastructure, and the replacement of portions of sidewalks and curbs that will be ripped up because of the construction.

The Township of Selwyn has received over \$3 million combined from both the federal and provincial governments through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program's Green Infrastructure Stream fund to support upgrades at the Lakefield Water Treatment Plant, the recommissioning of the Lakefield Standpipe and the replacement of water mains under Strickland Street and Prospect Street in the Village of Lakefield to meet current health and safety standards, as well as preventative maintenance.



On October 23, 2023, the Selwyn Fire Department received 198 Combination Fire/CO2 alarms (valued at \$11,800) through Project Zero, an annual Enbridge Gas public education campaign delivered in partnership with the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council. The program promotes the installation of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms where Enbridge operates. Volunteers distributed these free alarms as part of their annual public education on the importance of having working smoke alarms.

Beginning July 1, 2024, Selwyn Township will become the operating authority for the water and wastewater systems in both the Village of Lakefield and the Woodland Acres Subdivision. A new branch of the Public Works Department has been created to bring in the staff required to operate these systems. An overlapping transition period with the current operating authority Peterborough Utilities Inc. will provide cross-over training opportunities.

Selwyn Township looks forward to continuing to provide high quality water and wastewater services to the residents of the Village of Lakefield and Woodland Acres, local businesses, and all parties who rely on these systems.

As of January 2024, Selwyn Township is now responsible for Water and Sewer billing in the Village of Lakefield **only**. The rates have remained the same since July 2023, but the billing period has changed: flat rate accounts will receive their bills every 2 months and will be for a 60-day period. The Old Post Office Has Officially Re-Opened!

On Saturday, April 27, 2024, Selwyn Township Council members officially reopened The Old Post Office at 12 Queen Street, Lakefield with a ceremonial ribbon cutting.

The Old Post Office was constructed in 1914, and has served as a post office, apartments, recreational retail space, police station and Chamber of Commerce office. The building, classical in style, with Italianate features, is typical of public buildings built during the tenure of Chief Architect, David Ewart. The building served as the Village post office for 60 years, from 1916 to 1976. The four-sided clock tower of the former post office makes it the tallest building in the Village and a landmark of the downtown. It received municipal heritage designation in 2014 during its 100th Anniversary celebration.

The roughly \$1.6-million project was funded by the Township (about \$950,000), and the Government of Canada's Canada Community Revitalization Fund (\$750,000), delivered by the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario.

Following the brief speeches, Council members and residents were invited to tour the newly renovated building, which now includes a fully accessible main entrance leading to an elevator, accessible public washroom, modernized office space, board room, and two kitchenettes.
